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IN MEMORIAM: TED COOKE

Edward Charles "Ted" Cooke was born December 12, 1938 in London, England, the youngest child in a large family. He always said he was raised by his two older sisters and recalled running as fast as he could with them on the streets of London near their home when they heard the sound of the "doodlebugs" (German V-1 flying bomb, or "buzz bomb"), hoping to take cover before the sound stopped and the buzz bombs detonated.

In the aftermath of WW2, Ted learned to work hard with his hands but this also led him to a lifelong love affair with model airplanes. Over his lifetime he built many scale models of all sizes and descriptions. These included both ducted fan and turbine powered jets and was a hobby which he pursued prolifically throughout his 80+ years on earth. Ted was also an athlete who loved playing soccer and badminton in his youth and beyond. In addition he was an accomplished scuba diver who regularly traveled the world to dive in exotic waters.

In his early 20s, Ted met Doreen who became his wife on December 19, 1959. She was his true love and he always put her first...even ahead of his model airplanes! When their three children were young, the Cookes moved to Melton Mowbray in the Midlands north of London. There they spent the majority of their lives. It was also there that Ted and his business partner established and operated Lee and Cooke Roofing, Ltd. until his partner retired and Ted's older son, Tony, succeeded his father as CEO. Ted worked part time with Tony for a number of years after his retirement to help finance his many trips abroad. He finally retired fully in the early 2000s.

In 1981Ted met Larry Wolfe for the first time at the world's first ever model jet rally in Abingdon, UK. It was a casual meeting. In December 1984 Ted randomly phoned Jet Hangar Hobbies to ask Larry if he had some Rhom Air retract parts in stock. Ted and Doreen were on an around-the-world trip in celebration of their 25th wedding anniversary and planned to spend a couple days in Los Angeles—their last stop on the way back to the UK. Larry being Larry (*ahem!*) asked Ted if either he or his wife smoked cigarettes! When the answer was negative, Larry randomly invited the two of them to stay at his house while they were in LA! The Cookes insisted they would only stay 2 nights...they ended up staying *11 days!* Such was the beginning of an incredible lifelong friendship in which both families merged and became one.



Many trips to California ensued over the following years, usually during the winter months or over the fall holidays, on average about every other year and twice in the years the Wolfe children were married. During their many visits Ted attended the Arizona Jet Rally a number of times, made many local friends, built model airplanes during his stays, and helped cultivate Chris Wolfe's model rocket interests. Ted also attended many Scale Squadron meetings, and participated in Squadron Christmas parties as well as Show & Tells. He was the Squadron's International Member! The Cookes made their last trip to California in 2015.

Ted greatly enjoyed Coors Lite beer which he referred to as "fizzy 'wotah' (water)"! He had a uniquely realistic attitude toward life, was warm and loving, and what you saw was what you got—a jovial guy with no hair other than his signature lamb chops! Perhaps a Silky's toast might be the Squadron's final tribute to Ted Cooke.

Ted left us on July 24, 2023 to after a short battle with cancer. May he Rest In Peace and may light perpetual shine upon him. He is survived by his devoted wife, Doreen, two sons, Tony and John, 7 grandsons, and at least a dozen great-grandchildren. His daughter, Wendy Cooke Brown, predeceased him in about 2010.

FIELD TRIP: IOWA AVIATION MUSEUM

Recently my wife and I took a trip to the Midwest to visit family and friends. After stirring up trouble in Wisconsin for a couple days we drove down to Iowa and killed a few more days with some friends. One of the things we were able to do was visit the **Iowa Aviation Museum** (IAM) in Greenfield, IA which includes the **Iowa Aviation Hall of Fame**. I didn't do any real research in advance of our visit so I wasn't exactly sure what to expect, but I was prepared for anything. Our friends who live there said it would be well worth our while and they haven't been wrong yet.

As our travel plans worked out, the "girls" found other things to do this day and the "guys" were left to their own devices to explore the museum. (Never a bad thing, right?)

On approaching the museum building you probably won't be very impressed (**Photo 1**) but as the old saw goes, "don't judge a book by its cover." The fairly compact building houses a pretty amazing collection with a central theme of "anything aviation that has a connection to lowa." All displays, biographies, artifacts, and everything else are tied to people from lowa or events that occurred in lowa. And, as it turns out, that's a *lot* of aviation history!

At the entrance to the museum you'll find several display cases with artifacts and information relating to many eras of aviation in the United States (**Photo 2**). These are arranged in roughly chronological order from vintage (Wright brothers, Curtiss, etc.) through the Space Age (rockets, space shuttle, and more).

The Collection

The museum is privately owned and operated by **Greg and Kris Schildberg**. Greg has a day job as a geologist and leaves the day-to-day operation of the museum to Kris and whatever volunteers she can round up. Most of the airplanes in the collection were scouted and acquired by Greg based

on his interest in vintage aviation (and his bank account at the time). Most of the general artifacts and other items were donations from fellow lowans.

There is also an extensive aviation library where you'll find books, service manuals, specifications, maps, uniform patches, squadron insignia, and other aviation-related memorabilia for all types of aircraft and aircraft operations.

The scope of the collection is staggering. Most museums tend to focus on a particular aspect of











aviation; be it aircraft, engines, support systems, or whatever. IAM focuses on Iowa-related aviation which means you'll find items all across the board. The collection comprises around 30 vintage aircraft (most of them ready-to-fly) and thousands of artifacts of all types, including uniforms, documents, models, equipment, hand-written pilot logs, annotated aerial survey maps of Hiroshima following the atomic bomb blast, early radio equipment, a set of photos of Doolittle's Raiders autographed by the Iowan crew members, and even a wedding dress made from WWII parachute silk (**Photo 5**).

Iowa Aviation Hall of Fame

The Iowa Aviation Hall of Fame (IAHOF) is housed in the

IAM and was founded in 1990. The IAHOF contains a permanent tribute for each Hall of Fame inductee and is the only place in the world that focuses on Iowa's aviation heritage. The IAHOF currently includes 80+ inductees and more are added every year through the museum's nomination and selection process (**Photo 6**).





On Docents

Docents are always my favorite part of visiting museums and **Kris Schildberg** and **Gene Hardisty** didn't disappoint. Kris is the wife of the museum founder and Gene is a long-time local volunteer who knows pretty much everything that Kris doesn't. Between them, you won't miss a bit. Both Kris and Gene were fountains of information relating to everything in the museum. I mentioned to the docents that I edit the Scale Squadron newsletter and asked permission to use any photos in upcoming newsletters. Permission was happily granted.

Norden Bombsight

One of the centerpieces of the museum is an original WWII Norden Bombsight that actually saw service in the European theater during WWII (**Photos 7 & 8**). The bombsight is complete and has been made functional through the efforts of a local lowan who apparently spent a *lot* of time working with them in actual combat. (Kris and Gene told me they could provide the name of

the restorer but then they'd have to kill me since the bombsight has never been fully declassified. I declined the offer to learn that little bit of trivia.)

The best thing about the bombsight (as with everything else in the museum) is that it's just sitting there on display where it's easily accessible to anyone who wants the closest look possible. I, for one, came away amazed at the complexity of the device. I've seen photos of course, but to be able to get nose to nose with the actual device was *very* cool.

Flying Models

The museum houses a large number of model airplanes, the bulk of which are plastic models. But there are large powered models on display throughout as well. Powered models include a lot of free flight models and a smaller number that might be RC. I was able to expand the museum's information base by identifying what I thought might be a FF model (Powerhouse), the engine used (a Brown Junior .609), the owner (we found an ID label inside the fuselage), and the approximate age (probably late 1930s or early 1940s). Based on the name tag, we determined that the owner (and probable builder) was an Iowa resident so the model really did belong in the museum.

Hangared Aircraft

The centerpiece of the museum (at least for me) is the collection of Vintage, Golden Age, and later airplanes. The museum's collection includes just a couple military aircraft with the majority being vintage general aviation examples (de Havilland Tiger Moth, Piper J-2 and J-3 Cub, Curtiss Robin (**Photo 11**), Aetna-Timm Aerocraft, Kari Keen, and lots more). The museum's owner (Greg Schildberg) keeps his eye open for potential additions to the collection and when they become available, he adds them to the inventory.

Pedal Planes

One thing that caught my eye was the collection of "pedal planes" on display (**Photo 13**). Kris said they finally had to start putting giant teddy bears in them to keep the smallest of the museum visitors from climbing

in and taking a ride around.

Drones & Dennyplanes

Soon after introducing myself as a member of a highly respected and internationally recognized model airplane club specializing in scale models, someone approached me and asked if I knew anything about "drones." I suggested that I might, depending on the context. After a couple other people came up and asked the same question, I started to wonder why they were so interested in drones. Someone finally mentioned that a random person had called the museum asking if they would be interested in a "WWII drone." Everyone initially thought this must be a prank since to no one's knowledge there were no "drones" operating in the WWII time frame.

I finally figured out what everyone was talking about and it could be none other than the drones manufactured by **Reginald Denny's Radioplane Company** during WWII as antiaircraft practice targets. After about the third time I told the story of Denny, Radioplane, and antiaircraft training someone finally mentioned that they had recently had a call from someone who had a WWII drone that they would like to donate to the museum.

I, of course, suggested that they drop everything and get on their fastest hot rod and go out and pick it up!

It turned out it was pretty much just a frame of a Radioplane drone (no engine and lot of missing parts) but I suggested that it's still an amazing part of history and deserves a place in the museum. Especially since it was a donation!

Unfortunately, my wife and I were flying out of Des Moines International Airport the next morning at 7:00am so I couldn't roll with the reclamation party. But I asked that they send photos of what they found and what they brought back.


Summary


I went to the Iowa Aviation Museum with no particular expectation. What I found was a *very* cool collection of vintage general aviation aircraft (including some one-of-a-kind examples) in their original flying condition and a

huge collection of aviation memorabilia that you're unlikely to see anywhere else. As I mentioned at the beginning of this article, the museum's focus is on things related to Iowa aviation. But don't forget that the Wright Brothers shop in Dayton, OH is only a few hours flying time from Greenfield, IA and aviation has a strong history in this part of the country.

This is a private collection and most of the artifacts and aircraft in the museum belong to the museum's owner, Greg Schildberg. Greg has a habit of picking up airplanes and doing just enough restoration to get them back into their original flying condition. That means you won't see any highly-polished hangar queens. But what you *will* see is a hangar full of aircraft that were restored to flying condition as they were last flown and then put away until they will be flown again.

All in all, I would strongly encourage a visit if you're ever anywhere near south-western Iowa. I guarantee it will be worth your time.


19: A 7:8 replica Nieuport **17** built by Iowan Richard Milburn.

20: Pitts S1-S flown by Olie Pash for 30 years in airshows all over the U.S. This aircraft was donated to the museum after Olie's last airshow at Offutt AFB near Omaha, NE in 2002. Olie was age 75 at the time.

21 & 22: This **Timm Aerocraft 2SA** is the last remaining of six prototypes built for USAAF consideration as an advanced trainer. Note the words to the wise instructor on the control panel.

























32 & 33: This Kari Keen "90" is one of only 32 that were built in 1931. As with the other aircraft on display, this one has been beautifully restored to its original flying condition. Note the minimal flight instruments and basic passenger restraint system.

34: A Ford Model A engine that has been converted for use in the original **Pietenpol Air Camper** homebuilt aircraft.

35 & 36: 1:8 scale C-130 Hercules & 1:10 scale B-52 Stratofortress models were donated by local modelers.

37 & 38: The collection includes both a **Piper J-2** and **J-3 Cub**. The J-3 is the one on floats. The J-2 was the first aircraft to bear the Piper name.

39: The **1929 Stearman C-3R** biplane was built in 1929 & was the last one built before Stearman was purchased by Boeing. This particular airplane was used to fly mail, cargo, & passengers in the early 1930s by Tri-State Airlines. .

40 & 41: Approximately 1:3 scale **Curtiss Pusher Model A & Wright Flyer** models hanging in the gift shop were built by local modelers.

41: The museum library includes thousands of books, magazines, videos, pilot log books, service manuals, maps, & other aviation-related materials.

42: A small part of the collection of unit patches and stickers collected by the museum.

WARBIRDS & CLASSICS 2023: SUMMARY

Warbirds & Classics 2023 is in the Books!

Event organizers were concerned that attendance might be off compared to the last couple years. As it worked out, attendance was right about where it needed to be with 72 pilots registered. Many more and we'd have been hard pressed to find pit space for everyone. This translated into around 125 registered models and an uncountable number of planes people just brought along. All in all, we had an estimated 200 airplanes on the flight line.

The raffle was a *huge* success. Prizes included two ready-to-fly planes out of **Sam Wright's** garage, a beautiful **F-82 Twin Mustang** ARF from **Larry Wolfe**, two wood kits and an engine provided by **Steve Penn**, batteries, building supplies, and more.

Thanks to the larger than expected turnout and generous donations from sponsors and Squadron members we were able to provide a significant donation to the **USMC Semper Fi & America's Fund**. Hats off to everyone who purchased raffle tickets and congratulations to the winners.



WARBIRDS & CLASSICS - AWARD WINNERS

Although Warbirds & Classics is *technically* a fun fly, there is also a small judging component where aircraft are judged and awards are given in various categories. The categories are a bit random and change from year to year. The judging is pretty subjective but the judges are all people who have been around scale modeling for a *long* time. Award winners were announced at the Saturday evening banquet. To no one's surprise, **Mike Greenshields** prepared customized awards for all category winners. Here are the award winners for 2023:

Golden Age Classic

This 1:3 scale **Waco YMF-5** belongs to **Pat Schreffler** of the Circle City Flyers. Pat built the 120" Waco from an AMR wood kit. Flying weight is 72 lbs. The model is covered using the Stits Poly-Fiber Fabric Covering System and was painted using automotive paint with an overall clear coat. Power comes from a **Moki 250** five-cylinder radial. All eyes were on this model whenever it flew.



WWII Warbird

Brian Young has been flying his giant **Republic P-47 Thunderbolt Razorback** for a number of years and his familiarity with the model shows. Most of Brian's models are big, fast, & loud and he uses every flight to put on a show. The P-47 is definitely a crowd-pleaser.



Formation Flying

Blackstar FPV is a group of guys working to develop an FPV system that puts the RC pilot *right in the cockpit*. **Thomas Williams** & **Alex Soldatov** showed off the state of the art in this area by not only flying close formation with a pair of **North American F-86 Sabers**, but doing it from behind FPV goggles. An *amazing* performance!



Classic Era

David Zagnoli built his beautiful **Ercoupe** from a Balsa USA kit. The 1:3 scale model has a 120" wingspan and is powered by a **Saito FG-61TS** fourstroke gas twin. The shiny parts are covered with **Scale Aero Flite Metal** self-adhesive aluminum sheet for a 100% authentic look.



Best EDF

Michelle Nolan has been flying her Boeing 737 Max 8 for a couple years & still enjoys it a lot. The 63" wingspan model weighs 10 lbs. & uses two 70mm fans. Michelle flies the model in a very realistic manner—probably due to her decades of flying in the left seat of full-size 737s as a pilot for United Airlines. The model started life as a Freewing ARF but immediately went through one of Michelle's meticulous makeovers. She stripped & repainted the model, added navigation lights, & UA livery from Callie Graphics.



Innovation Award

Jaime Colley is a notorious experimenter when it comes to designing & building his scratch-built projects. His Fokker D.VIII is a perfect example of this. He designed it using CAD software & built it it using mostly foam sheet & poster board. There's some carbon fiber & even a little lite ply & basswood. He hand-painted the lozenge pattern & 3D printed most of the smaller details. This was a well-earned Innovation Award.



People's Choice

People's Choice is arguable the most prestigious awards since it's voted on by pilots & spectators alike. The voting was *very* close as there were lots of beautiful models on hand. But in the end, **Ed McCormick** won the award for his efforts on an **RAF S.E. 5a** that he's been working on for over two years. Ed built the model from a Balsa USA wood kit & covered it using the **Stits Poly-Fiber Fabric Covering System**. Power is from a **Zenoah G38** gas engine & all-up flying weight is 25 lbs. This was a well-deserved award.



Unique WWII

Keith Hedge is fond of building models of unusual aircraft & his **Culver Cadet** fits his style. In real life, the Cadet was used as everything from a two-seat general aviation aircraft to a radiocontrolled target drone used by the USAAF in the 1940s. Keith built the model from scratch & said he enjoys showing up with models that other pilots can't immediately identify.

About the Commander's Awards





There were also instructions describing how to convert that sheet of paper into a hand-launch glider by folding along the dotted lines. (I won't say that folding the glider was difficult but we felt fortunate to have the able assistance of a professional electrical engineer in the form of **Lani Colley** to help us figure out the instructions.)

It was ironic to watch a bunch of people who had just finished a long couple days of "noncompetitive fun-flying" suddenly drop into grim-faced, heads down, sober contest mode over a folded paper glider. To say that the competition was pretty fierce would be an understatement. Contestants were disappearing behind bushes and walls to trim their models where no one would spy on their secret methods.


When everyone had a chance to trim their model, the show began. The rules were pretty simple: Each contestant had two opportunities to toss their airplane as far as possible. The airplanes had to fly reasonably straight and stay within a specific path. A couple entries went great distances but since they landed well outside the designated area, they had to be disqualified. (And since Joni CD'd this event, there were no protests.)

Joni pulled together a nice selection of prizes that went to the pilots who flew the farthest (**Photo 2**). It probably comes as no surprise that "Mr. Jet," **Larry Wolfe**, won with the longest distance. But there were a few close contenders so it wasn't a slam dunk. **Photo 3** shows the final landing locations of the gliders that stayed in bounds.





When all was said and done, everyone agreed that it was a terrific way to spend an hour or so and everyone had a great time. Now everyone is wondering what Joni will plan for next year.



Warbirds & Classics – Paper Airplanes



DOCUMENTATION: BROWN B-2

The Brown B-2 "**Miss Los Angeles**" was a Golden Age racer built in 1934 by the Brown Aircraft Co. of Montebello, CA.

The aircraft was designed for competitive flying. It was a low-winged monoplane designed with a minimal cross-section to reduce drag. It had an open single-person cockpit and a fixed tail-skid and undercarriage.

"Miss Los Angeles" made her debut at the 1934 National Air Races fully decked out in a distinctive scarlet paint with lettering and accents in gold leaf. Entered in the inaugural three-race Greve Trophy competition, she took first place in speed with 213.257 mph. Shortly thereafter the B-2 turned up at the Thompson Trophy race and flew smartly for a second-place trophy.

The B-2 participated in the 1935 National Air Races flown by Marion McKeen, but could manage no better than fifth place for the Greve Trophy. McKeen piloted the plane again in the 1936 and 1937 races, finishing fifth each year.

"Miss Los Angeles" turned up next at the National Air Races in 1939 with a new cantilevered wing and retractable landing gear. These modifications were undone when it was determined they were ineffective. During the Greve Trophy races, pilot Lee Williams experienced an engine failure while turning into the scatter pylon, stalled, and crashed fatally.


The original B-2 was never rebuilt but a replica built by Ed Marquart, renowned replicator of Golden Age racers, is currently part of the collection at Fantasy of Flight in Polk City, FL.

The B-2 has been modeled many times over the years and there are several sets of plans readily available.




